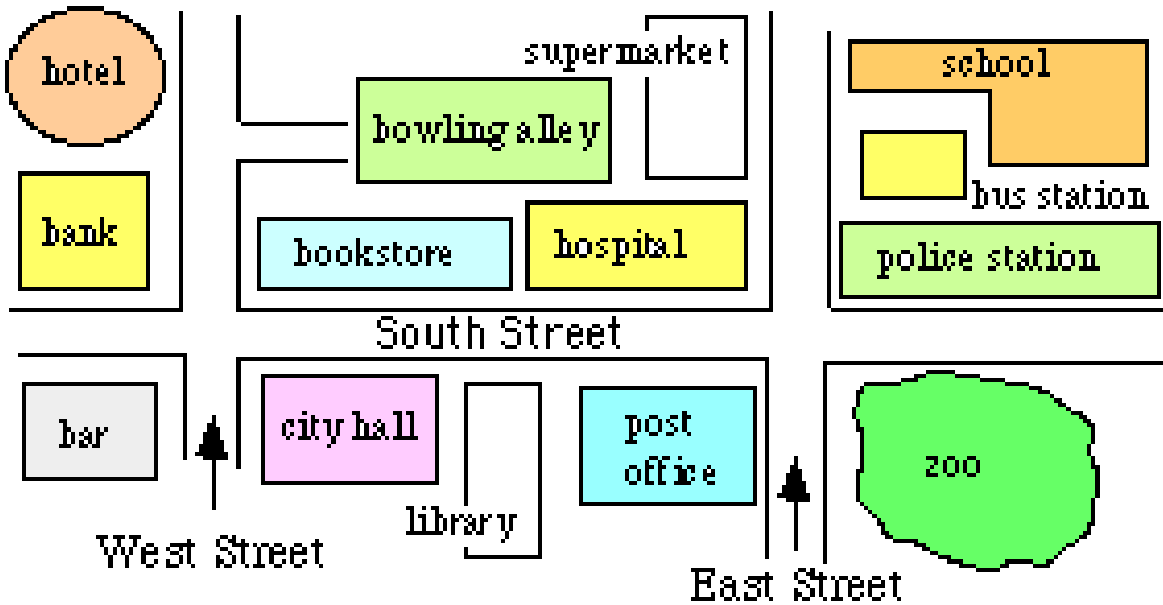



RODD STEWART



Roderick David Stewart was born at 507 Archway Road, in London. He was the youngest of the five children of Robert Stewart and Elsie Gilbert, his parents. His father was Scottish and he worked as a matter builder in Edinburgh, while Elsie was English and she grew up in London. They married in 1928 and the couple had two sons and two daughters while they were living in Scotland, then they moved to Highgate.

Stewart was born at home during World War II, half an hour after a German [V-2](#)

[missile](#) warhead fell on the local Highgate police station. In spite of that time, he always remembers his childhood as "fantastically happy".

He left school at the age of 15 and he worked some time as a printer but he wanted to become a famous footballer. His family was very interested in football and in one singer, Al Jolson. He played in some leagues but soon discovered that it wasn't his goal in life, he started working in his family newsagent's as a delivery boy, he wasn't convinced about his life at all. He started to listen to British and American topical folk artists such as [Ewan MacColl](#), [Alex Campbell](#). He had a baby but was given to adoption and he broke his relationship with his girlfriend and then, in the 60s his musical career began. He adopted a particular style and started playing in some local bands.

He tried a solo career and in 1975 he wrote and sang the song 'sailing', it number one hit in the UK. This was not the only song which reached top hits positions.
